**The Art of Subversion in Inquisitorial Spain**-Manuel De Costa Fontes 2005 Rojas's *Celestina* (1499) is perhaps the second greatest work of Spanish literature, right after *Don Quixote*, and Delicado sought to surpass it with *La Lozana andaluza* (1530), an important precedent of the picaresque novel. Both works were written during the height of the Inquisition, when the only relatively safe way for New Christian writers of Jewish extraction like Rojas and Delicado to express what they felt about the discrimination they suffered and their doubts regarding the faith that had been forced upon their ancestors was in a covert, indirect manner. Some scholars have detected this subversive element in Rojas' and Delicado's corrosive view of the Christian societies in which they lived, but this book goes far beyond such impressionism, showing through abundant textual evidence that these two authors used superficial bawdiness and claims regarding the morality of their respective works as cover to encode attacks against the central dogmas of Christianity: the Annunciation, the Virgin Birth, the Incarnation, and the Holy Trinity. This book, which will generate controversy among Hispanists, many of whom have refused to examine these works for non-Catholic views, will be of interest not only to students and scholars of Spanish literature, but also to those involved in Jewish studies, Medieval European history, and cultural studies.

**The Unrecognized Precursors of Montemayor's Diana**-Elizabeth Rhodes Offutt 1992 Jorge de Montemayor was one of the most popular and influential writers of the Spanish Golden Age. Author of the *Diana*, Spain's first pastoral narration, Montemayor was among the most published authors of his time and had among his followers such important writers as Miguel de Cervantes, Honore d'Urfe, and Sir Philip Sidney. In this radical reevaluation of the *Diana*, Elizabeth Rhodes proposes to bring Montemayor's writings, and those ideologically similar to them, closer to the modern reader by redefining and exploring the context in which his book was conceived and universally applauded. She examines the *Diana* in its full historical and cultural contexts and acknowledges Montemayor's religious works as the unrecognized precursors of his *Diana*. This reinterpretation harmonizes the *Diana* with its author's other writings and accounts for issues left unresolved by previous approaches to the text. It also explains the book's extraordinary success in its own day and the multitude of imitations it inspired, as well as modern readers' difficulties in appreciating it. *The Unrecognized Precursors of Montemayor's Diana* will be of interest to specialists in Golden Age Spanish literature, as well as to classical and Renaissance scholars dedicated to the study of the pastoral, early modern forms of narrative, and the relationship between religious writing and fiction.



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
